My Camino de Santiago - Spain, 2025

I started my summer off with 30 days of hiking in northeast Spain, during a heatwave of record setting highs. LOL, lucky me.

My partner and I flew out of Rochester on June 24th, just late enough to miss our plane to Barcelona.

We were rescheduled for the following evening, and had to stay overnight in Philadelphia. We took advantage of the opportunity to visit the city.

In an unbelievable occurrence of fate, we ended up sitting at a table in the Public Market and next to a young woman who plays ice hockey with my granddaughter. What are the odds?

Anyway after 30 days of hiking, we covered just over 240 miles from the mouth of the Ebro River where it empties into the Mediterranean Sea to the beautiful city of Logrono, Spain.

My most vivid memories are of the many towns along the way. Because of the intense heat (100f+ many afternoons), we started hiking at 5:30 am, roughly about dawn.

We powered our 8 to 14 mile hiking days with paella, sausages, potatoes of all sorts, cheeses, jamon and wine.

Most enjoyable for Deb and I was how much our Spanish had improved. Being on our own where they don't speak English (despite the popular belief), each day was an opportunity to meet the local Spanish folks and engage them one-on-one.

It is true that when you make an effort to respect the local customs and traditions, warm hearts and spirits open their doors to you.

Why Do Leaves Change Color in the Fall?

(Al-assisted)

Leaves change color in the fall due to changes in daylight and temperature, which affect the production of pigments in the leaves.

Here's a breakdown of the science behind it.

1. Chlorophyll Breakdown (Green)

- During the growing season, leaves are green because of chlorophyll, the pigment that allows plants to photosynthesize (convert sunlight into energy).
- As days get shorter and temperatures cool in autumn, trees begin to shut down chlorophyll production in preparation for winter.
- As the chlorophyll fades, the green color disappears.

2. Other Pigments Become Visible

- Carotenoids: These pigments
 (which were already in the leaf)
 become visible as chlorophyll breaks
 down. They give leaves yellow and
 orange colors.
 - Found in carrots, corn, and other yellow-orange plants.
- Anthocyanins: These pigments are produced in the fall and give leaves

red, purple, or blue colors.

- Their production depends on light, temperature, and the leaf's chemistry.
- Bright sunny days and cool nights tend to increase anthocyanin production.

3. Environmental Factors

- Temperature, light, and water supply all influence the intensity and duration of fall colors.
 - Warm sunny days + cool nights = more vibrant reds.
 - Drought or early frost can dull the colors or cause leaves to fall early.

Summary:

Leaves change color in the fall primarily because **chlorophyll breaks down**, revealing other pigments (carotenoids and anthocyanins) that were masked during the summer.

Membership Trends


